The Acceptance of Homosexuality is on the Rise

The homosexual social movement has been around for about 150 years back in the 1870s. Lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT+) had been introduced in 1990s before added the "Q" stands for queer3, and a recognition movement of gays and lesbians was progressing by the 20th century.

In the earlier day, 71 countries worldwide, mostly in the Middle East, Africa, and Asia considered homosexuality as a crime.⁵ Nevertheless, even without the criminalization, many LGBTQ+ people still cannot express their attitude as one due to hate crimes and discrimination against their sexuality.⁶ In addition, 11 countries, including Iran, Northern Nigeria, Saudi Arabia, Somalia, Yemen, Afghanistan, Brunei, Mauritania, Pakistan, Qatar and the United Arab Emirates imposed a death penalty for the crime.⁷

Normally, developed countries with wealthier economies offer more acceptance of homosexuality; and the highest accepting countries are Sweden, Netherlands, and Germany.⁸ In addition, the first legal same-sex marriage countries are the Netherlands (2000), Belgium (2003), Canada (2005), and Spain (2005).⁹ At the same time, after a long struggle, public acceptance is growing including countries with strong cultural influence.¹⁰ China, the nation led by the Communist Party, is expected to eventually protect the rights of LGBTQ+ people.¹¹ However, public opinion in society remains divided depending on country, region and economic development despite the lawfulness of the same-sex marriage and the legal guarantee of the rights of LGBTQ+ people globally.¹²

The Cambodian Constitution¹³ ensures that Cambodian citizens are "equal before the law, enjoying the same rights, freedom and fulfilling the same obligation" despite different statuses. ¹⁴ Statistically, homosexual activity is legal in Cambodia, although the same-sex marriage does not state in Cambodian law but some region recognized it as no law against the issue. ¹⁵ The lack of recognition and protection of LGBTQ+ people made them feel isolated and prevent them from fully enjoying the rights to participate in the society. ¹⁶ Nonetheless, on January 2023, a UN expert stated that Cambodia starts to integrating of LGBT persons in all sectors and protecting them from violence and discrimination. ¹⁷

In general, even though the recognition of homosexuality has been widely accepted in some countries, it can be seen as a challenge when discussing such matters with family
